The Demographics of Guatemalan Indigenous Unaccompanied Minors. This project uses data received through a FOIA request on unaccompanied alien children (UACs) detained between 2014 and 2020. Based on this voluminous data, I will examine the differences in age, gender, and language spoken among unaccompanied minors, who primarily hail from Guatemala, El Salvador, and Honduras. My specific aim is to analyze how the demographics of indigenous youth migrants compare to those of non-indigenous youth.
